
Quick Start Guide for Students

Thinking about college? Sign up now at virtualcollegefairs.org and start exploring! Then, on each fair date, you can drop in on Zoom sessions offered by more than 600 colleges to listen, connect, and ask questions.

1. Sign Up

Don't wait until the day of the fair! Go to virtualcollegefairs.org ahead of time and click the "Sign Up" button. (If you signed up previously, click "Log In").

Fill out the sign-up form. As a final step, pick the virtual fairs you'd like to attend—Sept. 13, Oct. 12, Oct. 18, or Nov. 8. Click "Register" for each.



2. Zoom

Do you have Zoom on your device? If not, please download it ahead of time.

3. List of Colleges

Several days before each fair begins, log in and take a look around. Click the "Colleges" tab to see which colleges will be at the fair.

You can sort the list by A-Z or Z-A. If you already have a college in mind, search for it by name.

The "Filter" is really helpful. This is how you can narrow your results by location, majors offered, and other criteria. Once you find a college that interests you, use the ♥ to add it to your "Favorites" list.

4. List of Live Sessions

On the day of the virtual fair, colleges will offer live Zoom sessions you can attend.

Click the "Live Sessions" tab. You'll see literally hundreds of sessions to choose from!

Because there are so many, it's best if you look through the sessions before the fair date. Use "Filter" to narrow your results. Or click "Show Schedule" to see sessions by start time. Pro Tip: Colleges located on the East Coast will offer their sessions towards the beginning of the fair while colleges on the West Coast will offer sessions towards the end.

Quick Start Guide for Students

5. Log In, Day Of

Yay, it's the day of the fair! Log in on Sept. 13, Oct. 12, Oct. 18, or Nov. 8.

Each fair is eight hours long. There's no need to stay the whole day—instead, plan your time using the reminders you added to "My Schedule."


Note: Some sessions are popular and will fill up quickly. When a session is about to start, be sure to click the "Join Now" button that will appear.

6. Watch Videos

At any time (not just during a fair), you can click on "Videos" to watch videos each college has posted. Use "Filter" to narrow your choices.

7. Schedule a Meeting

Another option is to meet one-on-one with a college's admission representative. This is great if you missed a session or have specific questions to ask. To do so, go to a college's profile page, click "Schedule a Meeting," and then pick a date and time (if available). You'll receive text reminders and the meeting will be added to "My Schedule."



8. Get Advice

During each virtual fair, you can click on the blue chat button for advice. This will connect you to a college advising expert from NACAC. (NACAC is the worldwide association for counseling and admission professionals—we're happy to help!).

9. Attend a NACAC Meet-Up

Are you looking for general information about financial aid, scholarships, college applications, and other topics? If so, attend a NACAC Meet-Up. These helpful Zoom sessions are available at each fair. To find them, enter "NACAC" in the "Search by College" field and click the "Remind Me" button to add them to "My Schedule."

Scholarship Opportunities

Army ROTC offers generous meritbased scholarships to qualified students. They can defray the full cost of tuition, and provide additional tax-free allowances for books, supplies, equipment, and necessary fees.

- Four-Year Scholarship For eligible high school students or high school graduates with four academic years left to complete their degree.
- Three-Year Scholarship For eligible students with three academic years left to complete their college degree.
- Two-Year Scholarship For eligible students with two years of college remaining or high school students planning to attend a Military Junior College (MJC).
- Guaranteed Reserve Forces Duty Scholarships For eligible students who want to combine a career in the private sector with service as an Officer in the Reserve Component. If selected, the student is guaranteed placement into the Reserve Component upon their commissioning.

Army ROTC Facts at a Glance

There are 274 college campuses that host Army ROTC programs and over 700 additional partnership campuses linked to the host colleges.

Army Officers can choose to pursue full-time careers on Active Duty or parttime service in the Army Reserve Component (Army Reserve or National Guard).

Army ROTC commissions more than 70 percent of the Army's lieutenants each year. The majority of Officers in today's Army got their start through Army ROTC

Students can enroll right out of high school or they can enroll later, as long as they have at least two academic years left in their undergraduate or graduate programs.

Army ROTC is a college elective that develops decision making, management, and leadership skills that enhance Cadets' future success in the military or civilian sector.



Army ROTC offers over 2,000 full-tuition scholarships nationally to high school seniors every year.

Scholarship Eligibility Requirements

- Be a U.S. citizen.
- Be between the ages of 17 and 26 and/or must be able to commission as an Officer by age 30.
- Have a high school cumulative grade point average of at least 2.50.
- Have a high school diploma or equivalent.
- Score a minimum of 1000 on the SAT (math/verbal) or 19 on the ACT (excluding the writing test scores).
- Meet the physical standards.
- Civil convictions are reviewed on a case-by-case basis.
- Agree to accept a commission and serve in the Army on Active Duty or in the Reserve Component (Army Reserve or National Guard).
