Christian Academy is more than academics, sports, science, and the arts. We are also more than an integrated Bible program, missions, and spiritual growth. We are a Christian community.

Our family changed schools this year. I say, 'our family,' not just my kids, because we also left dear friends when we switched schools. And, it's been brutal. The first day of school at drop off, I sat in the parking lot and cried for 30 minutes, convinced we'd made the wrong decision. But it wasn't long before my kids came home talking about boys named Ian, TJ, Chips, and several others. I assumed they were boys in their class, but later found out they were seniors on the boys' basketball team.

Some had outdoor lunch while my boys had recess. They used this time, not to hang out with their friends, but to play basketball with my first & second grader. All of these young men volunteered to officiate at my boys' intramural games. They were amazing examples. In our last week before school let out, I went to pick my boys up. They were crying inconsolably. The boys' basketball team was on their way to regionals when they called the bus back and cancelled the tournament. Not sure how everything they had looked forward to could have been taken away more cruelly. My kids had rounded the corner into the gym on the seniors in tears. And, it broke them. And, honestly, it broke me. I know those boys will always remember disappointment and lost opportunities.

But I'm going to remember how much they meant to our family... how they went out of their way to be kind to my kids at a time of transition for our family. Thank you 2020 Seniors! We love you & are going to miss you more than you know."





Art with a message

Our nationally recognized art program allows our students to fully develop their talents while giving them local, national, and international platforms to share their work and the message of Christ. A few examples

- Students from all schools and all grades provided art for a European Gospel exhibit proclaiming the "Light of God."
- The National Scholastic Art and Writing Competition *presented 39* awards to CAL and CAI students, with two pieces displayed in New York City's Carnegie Hall.
- Louisville *magazines highlighted student articles and art*, reaching over 20,000 households with encouraging and challenging messages.
- CAI students created Valentine *cards for WAYFM's Cards that Care* program and won numerous state awards in the Symphony in Art
- Elementary students learned drawing basics incorporating art with their own fruits of the spirit.
- Eight student pieces for the Derby Art competition were displayed throughout Kentucky.
- Art clubs on various campuses gave students extra opportunities to expand and use their *talents to benefit others*.

Athletics that goes beyond the playing field

The heart of an athlete is not measured in wins and losses, but in how talent is shared with others. So just imagine:

- With *over 150 total sports teams*, Kindergarten-12th grade, novice and elite athletes *all play to their potential* in an encouraging and Christ-honoring environment.
- Varsity players, playing for regional and state championships, use their free time to encourage and teach younger students.
- 22% of our seniors *signed to play at the college level* (vs. a 6%
- State championships were awarded to CAL girls' basketball, girls' cross country and girls' swimming; sectional championship to CAI boys' basketball and district titles to CAL girls' soccer, girls' basketball and cross country.
- State middle school championship was earned in Southwest boys' golf; league, division and tournament championships in 7th grade field hockey, 3-4th and 5-6th football, 7th grade boys' basketball, and 6th grade girls' basketball.
- Courier-Journal *players of the year* in CAL girls' golf, girls' soccer and girls' basketball; CAI NTSPY honors for 12 athletes and six Courier-Journal sports awards.

A community of compassion and support

Christian Academy's student body reflects 340 different churches, over 37 birth countries, the full range of economic support, and a diversity broader than the general Louisville community (up to 26%, varying by campus). This is a foundation to daily appreciate and serve all diversity.

- Students don't just learn about but they connect with different cultures. For example, middle school students packed over 60,000 meals for a Honduran Christian school and then established regular Skype sessions to build personal cross-cultural relationships. High school students had a community outreach as they regularly visited and shared at ethnic restaurants.
- All four campuses engage with our 18 Providence students with Down syndrome, including our Indiana high school seniors who visited weekly to build special relationships.
- Elementary students make a difference in outreach, such as our Southwest campus sending letters and packages to our troops in Afghanistan and then providing a campus-wide welcome when one parent returned from duty.
- Biblical integration teaches daily *respect for each student's unique identity* in Christ, spurred on by student initiatives such as diverse Chapel speakers and the ongoing mission for students to know that Christ died for all.

Supporting the needs of each student

We need to address more than academics to help today's students. In an especially challenging year, our students needed to deal with many school and personal issues. Daily, we faced these struggles together.

- Elementary counselors introduced *emotional support tools* to help even young students deal with personal issues.
- Ongoing elementary *MAPS assessments* help teachers quickly identify and focus on learning gaps.
- Academic resource counselors helped students be their own advocates for their individual learning needs now and when they
- Rock Creek opened its innovative Sensory Gym, to help all students find appropriate motion therapy and classroom breaks.
- Elementary teachers and counselors used this year's theme of "Knowing God" to show students that God loves us, has a plan for us, and replaces fear and anxiety with truth and comfort.
- Middle school students struggling with identity and stress found support by high school students sharing their own struggles and praying for them, helping them turn their cares over to God.

Theater for an audience of One

Elementary students discover they can share God in action within their first performing opportunities. Older students find they are living God's message as they are transformed by the messages they share.

- Elementary and middle school programs included performances of Pilgrim's Journey (RC), Straight Out of Bethlehem, Peter Pan (ES), Sherlock Holmes (CAI), and a new worship dance group (SW).
- Indiana's *The Diary of Anne Frank* presented horrors of Nazi supremacy, but God had prepared our students a year before with the opportunity to visit Frank's home while on a Poland missions
- Productions of Bye, Bye, Birdie and Little Women of Orchard House (ES) and Beauty and the Beast (CAI) reflected key themes that God guides the humble, to speak in love, and love beyond differences.
- Over 400 students participated in our performances. • Our high school programs have now been selected as pilot schools
- for scenic projections by Broad Media and for adjudication by outside theater judges.

Technology ready for uncertain times, evident in our COVID-19 / remote learning transition

Beginning over three years ago, Christian Academy began a plan to provide teachers and students with skills to teach and learn with the latest technology:


- More than **50%** *of our teacher development time* has been technologically based since 2018.
- Our in-house training has been guided by our Google-certified curriculum specialists, many of whom have been asked to instruct other area schools and teachers in teaching technology.
- This year, over 2,800 students and 300 teachers transitioned to remote learning with *only one day of interruption*.
- With devices already out to high school students, we were also *able*
- to give Chromebooks to all 1st-8th grade students requesting them. • Using assignments, Zoom, and Google groups, our *Christian* growth was enhanced through student prayer and discussion groups
- and challenges to examine our faith in uncertain times. • Christian Academy remains on the cutting edge of technological learning trends in school and college, implementing synchronized, eLearning, and remote vehicles as appropriate, while maintaining our Christian mission.

Music with a higher purpose

With over 48 different musical ensembles, Christian Academy's music program provides an exceptional music experience for every level of musical interest and ability.

- Music begins in Kindergarten, and our young students were recognized with six students selected to the Indiana elementary honors choir and 14 middle school students selected to Indiana and Kentucky all state choirs.
- Twenty of our high school band and choir students were selected as all state and honors performers, with another 41 recognized at the all district, region or section level.
- In competition, over 58 CAI soloists and ensembles received *gold or silver ratings*.
- Over 110 students led worship and praise in our school chapels, starting in 5th through 12th grade.
- WAVE3 featured Christmas performances from Rock Creek, English Station and CAI, and weather promos from the CAI Show Choir.
- One of the area's best programs, the English Station School of the Arts, celebrated its 10th anniversary.
- In sharing Christ with the community, the English Station marching band's show presented "The Tower of Babel," the CAI ensembles performed at the New Albany Amphitheater and Trinity United Methodist Church, and elementary students from all campuses performed at local nursing homes and with other ministries.



STEM based on understanding God's design behind everything

- Extensive STEM education, beginning in Kindergarten, uses collaborative and critical
- Christian Academy is Louisville's only high school STEM program to receive a Distinguished **Designation** (now earned for a second straight year) and is only one of four schools in Louisville to offer both engineering and biomedical courses.
- Over 30 students earned their white coats from our School of Biomedical Science. • CAI and CAL STEM students participate annually in the science-based Global Missions

Conference, so they learn a higher purpose for their science education.

• Our engineering and biomedical science courses are all eligible for college credit. • Robotics can begin in elementary and our Rock Creek competitive team also participated in national competition.
