Middle School Curriculum 2020-21

CAL Middle School courses are intentionally designed to provide rich opportunities for students to discover their talents and thrive emotionally, spiritually and academically before they transition into some of the more rigorous options in the High School such as the Honors or dual credit courses. School of the Arts or the School of Biomedical Science.

All courses are based on a 90-min. block schedule except for Exploratory Classes (see chart) and English classes, which are divided into two separate daily 90-min classes for English and Language Arts.

Daniel Program: Designed for students who demonstrate exceptional ability in reading and/or math. These courses reflect high rigor and challenge students in more rigorous depth-of-knowledge instruction. Acceptance into this program is based on MAP (Measurements of Academic Progress) testing requirements.
