TIPS FOR



ATTENDANCE and PUNCTUALITY

- Good attendance and punctuality are critical for high school success.
- Absence is defined as missing 15 minutes of class time.
- ☐ Students who accumulate more than 10 absences in a class for a semester may face academic penalties and may fail the class for the semester due to excessive absences.
- Students who accumulate more than 10 absences in an individual class per semester must provide documentation to the Attendance Appeals Committee
- ☐ TARDY TO CLASS- Upon the third tardy and at every third tardy thereafter, the student will receive a detention.

Changes from Middle School to High School

- Detentions are 45 minutes instead of 35 minutes.
- Tardy counts reset each semester rather than each quarter.
- There are no quarter grades, only semester grades.
- Late policy If an assignment is not turned in on time, students can earn 50% of the grade for 5 days and after that the student receives a zero.

Good Study Habit "Tips"

- Get organized
- DO your homework Sounds simple, but students who do not put enough effort into homework end up with grades that suffer!
- Get help <u>immediately</u> if you are having trouble in a class.
- Turn OFF the TV/VIDEO GAMES!
- Fast Fact Studies show that people forget almost half of what they hear or read within an hour. WRITE it down to remember it!

Academic support

- Help is available for students who are struggling!
- □ After school help time 3:05 3:30 p.m.
- May be requested by the teacher, student, or parent. Schedule at least a day in advance.
- Academic support staff
- A variety of services including tutoring and a daily accountability program.
- Contact with academic support staff members always goes through the teacher first.

Semester Exams

- May count up to 10% of semester grade during grade 9 and up to 20% by grade 12.
- To be eligible for consideration of exemption, a student must have at least a 90% average for the semester prior to the exam, after deductions for academic penalties, and no more than 5 absences from the class, including suspensions, during the semester.

Semester Exams

□ Teacher requirements for exemptions may be higher than the minimum. Also, teachers may opt to require all students to take the semester exam for their course. Teachers will announce the exam policy for each course at the beginning of the year in the course syllabus.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

- ■Uniforms One T-shirt and shorts set issued to student
- ☐ This year's cost for additional items was \$7 for shirt and \$7 for shorts (\$14 per set).
- □PE I & II credits should be earned before entering junior year.

Alternate Supervised P.E.

P.E. credit may be awarded to students who play a high school sport.

- Portfolio must be maintained (demonstration of mastery of P.E. standards)
- Completion of athletic season
- Mandatory Physicals Students participating in an athletic program during 2021-2022 school year are required to have a physical before the first practice. Physical form must be dated after April 1, 2021.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES

- □Students should only bring electronic devices that aid in the educational process.
- □School cannot be responsible for damages.
- Devices (including cell phones) used inappropriately will be confiscated and returned at a later date.

- □60 hours by graduation
- ■No pay for service work
- ■Not to include work for immediate or extended family members
- □Up to 50% hours in church/school setting or up to 100% in a community/missions setting

- Two Student Council representatives per class (as well as overall Student Body leaders).
- □Students will campaign in the fall.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

- □National Honor Society membership is based on service, character, leadership and academic performance.
- ■With a 3.3 cumulative GPA, students may be considered for induction after the first semester of sophomore year.
- □A five-member faculty council reviews students' resumes. Students need a majority vote for induction.



FELLOWSHIP OF CHRISTIAN ATHLETES

- □FCA encourages students to put their faith in action.
- □ It is open to all HS students, not just athletes
- Meets weekly during lunch
- □Some projects include: Louisville Rescue Mission, Parents Night Out,
 - school projects for coaches and athletes



SPANISH HONOR SOCIETY



- □Enrolled in a 3rd semester or higher Spanish course
- □Overall weighted GPA of 3.0 or higher and a grade of "B" or better in Spanish
- A five-member faculty council reviews students' resumes. Students need a majority vote for induction.

- ■PSAT Preliminary SAT taken in Sophomore and Junior year
- □ Junior year the PSAT is the qualifying exam for the National Merit Scholarship Program
- ■SAT/ACT Used for college admissions
- **□AP Exams**
- ■Biology I End of Course

Course Scheduling Options

- High School is not "one-size-fits-all"!
- Many Elective Choices
- Different levels of classes according to student skill level (College-Prep, Honors, AP)
- Check class prerequisites in course description catalog
- Opportunities to focus on areas of interest
- Study Hall
- Meet with your counselors to arrange classes or to discuss options

Indiana has found that:

- □A rigorous high school academic curriculum is the <u>single-most significant</u> <u>factor</u> determining a student's success in college.
- □Rigorous academic preparation is wanted by employers, colleges, apprenticeship programs, and the military.
- □ Careers for students without rigorous preparation are becoming fewer.

Freshman Class Schedule

- English I
- Science Biology, Earth/Space, or Integrated Chemistry/Physics
- Bible I
- Math (Algebra I or Geometry)
- □ PE or ASPE
- Electives World History, Health, Intro to Business, Personal Finance, Fine Arts, Intro to Engineering Design, Spanish I, Web Design, Computer Science I, AP Computer Science Principles, Theater Arts, or Study Hall

MATH OPTIONS

ALGEBRA I or GEOMETRY

- □Algebra I (CP or honors)= Pre-Calculus Track
- □Geometry (CP or honors)= AP Calculus Track
- □If Algebra I was taken in 8th grade a student can repeat for mastery.
- □If the semester grade for Algebra I is below "C" it will be recommended that the class be repeated.
- Must earn 6 math credits in grades 9-12 and take a math or a quantitative reasoning course (math, chemistry, physics, AP Biology, Economics, etc...) each year of high school.

FRESHMAN FINE ARTS OPTIONS

- ☐ Band and Jazz Band
- ■Choir and Show Choir
- □ Choral Chamber Ensemble
- Music Appreciation/History
- □Intro to II Dim./III Dim. Art
- Music Theory

It is possible to double-up in fine arts.

Zero Period Courses

- Some classes meet before school 2-3 days per week for ½ credit
- Show Choir
- □Jazz Band

Grade Scales

- Unweighted & Weighted
- □Unweighted = 4.0 GPA scale
- ■Weighted-
 - College Prep = 4.3 GPA scale
 - Honors = 4.8 GPA scale
 - AP & Dual Credit = 5.3 GPA scale

Valedictorian/Salutatorian Policy

- Determined by quality points, not weighted GPA.
- Quality points calculated on a maximum of 72 credits. If more than 72 credits earned, courses are chosen in the following order:
 - 1. Required courses
 - 2. CAI courses
 - 3. Other courses
- ☐ To be considered the student must:
 - 1. Attend CAI for 5 consecutive semesters immediately preceding graduation.
 - 2. Be a full-time high school student (8 semesters).
 - 3. Meet all graduation requirements outlined by CAI and the Core 40 or Academic Honors Diploma.


