## Welcome to AP Human Geography!

AP Human Geography is a year-long course designed to fulfill the curriculum expectations of a <u>one semester</u> <u>university human geography course</u>.

The purpose of teaching AP Human Geography at Christian Academy is to equip students to make biblically-informed decisions as members of a culturally-diverse society by developing within them an appreciation of geography, physical and cultural development, geo-political structure, and the environment. This course will challenge our Christian beliefs with a global philosophy presented in text and resources. My hope is students can inspect alignment with global worldviews and what they read and experience in their Christian worldview and develop the ability to craft well-developed arguments to express reasons for what they believe.

The course focuses on the processes and cause/effect relationships of human populations. Emphasis throughout the course is on the spatial distribution, differences in scale and cultural determinants influenced by global interaction and integration. If you don't know these terms, that's ok. You will learn.

The class also helps prepare you for the other AP courses that you may want to take through high school.

We look at why people live where they live, how they found themselves living where they are, and the influences that move or keep them where they live.

AP classes *develop* students as **critical thinkers**. If you enjoy challenges, figuring out the **why** behind world events, or enjoy discovering different areas of the world this is a great class for you.

## **AP Human Geography Summer Homework**

To become acclimated to this course, my desire is for you to have a general knowledge of the political maps of the different continents of the world. Your summer homework is to study and to label the following maps of the world. Upon arrival to class for the first day, you will need to print them off to turn in. I would suggest you print the maps and then label countries and color each by region of the map.

- Political map US
- Political map North America
- Political map South America
- Political map Central America
- Political map Europe
- Political map Africa and Middle East
- Political map of Asia

For each continent map, hand label the name of the country. For the US Map, label each state.

Secondly, color the map by region. What makes a region? Great question. <u>Define how you would define a region</u> and include it in the **key** of colors. This will <u>help me</u> see how <u>you</u> think.

Next, watch the following Mr. Sinn videos and write general notes on what you learn. 75-100 words should be sufficient. Again, this will *help me* see how *you* take notes.
