## **Course Descriptions**

Honors Chorale 1 credit Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 Honors Grading Scale

Prerequisite: audition required and Director Approval

Chorale is an auditioned, elite group specializing in small-ensemble and a cappella works, including madrigals and contemporary/pop literature. This ensemble will perform regularly in the school and community setting as the flagship choral ensemble of Christian Academy. Grades consist of regular participation, written and group assignments, sight singing exams, and performances. Participation outside of the regular school day is required and will be graded. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1st semester. Auditions for Chorale will be held after registration for the current school year has closed.

Men's Choir 1 credit Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 Regular Grading Scale

Men's Choir is a non-prerequisite class for young men, of all singing experience levels. This ensemble emphasizes the basic fundamental choral skills, which include music literacy, sight reading, vocal technique, and introductory music theory. They perform a variety of accompanied and a cappella standard choral literature for the male voice, and will also combine with the Women's choir during concerts. Grades consist of daily participation, individual sight singing and rhythm quizzes, performances, and written assignments. Participation outside of the regular school day is required and will be graded. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1<sup>st</sup> semester.

Women's Choir 1 credit Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 Regular Grading Scale

Women's Choir is a non-prerequisite class for young women, of all singing experience levels. It is an introductory to intermediate level group, building on the basic fundamental choral skills which include music literacy, sight reading, vocal technique, and introductory music theory. This group performs a variety of accompanied and a cappella standard choral literature for the female voice at varying levels of difficulty, and will also combine with the Men's Choir during concerts. Students will perform regularly throughout the semester in the school and community setting. Grades consist of daily participation, sight singing and rhythm quizzes, performances and written assignments. Participation outside of the regular school day is required and will be graded. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1st semester.

Show Choir 1 credit Grades 10, 11, 12 Regular Grading Scale

**Prerequisite:** High School Women's Choir or Chorale, audition and Director Approval required, maximum 30 students

Show Choir is an auditioned, performance-based group specializing in Broadway, pop, musical theater repertoire. Students will have the opportunity to perform and compete in local and regional festivals and contests throughout the school year. Grades consist of daily participation, sight singing, choreography exams, rhythm quizzes, and performances. Participation outside of the regular school day is required and will be graded. A uniform rental fee will be collected at the beginning of the year for ladies dresses. Uniform dance shoes are required. Participation in this ensemble requires students to purchase dance shoes and ladies uniform dance tights. All uniforms and accessories will be rented and purchased through the choral department. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1st semester. Auditions for Show Choir will be held after registration for the current school year has closed.

#### **Percussion Ensemble**

1 credit

Grades 9,10,11,12

Regular grading scale

Prerequisite: Must be enrolled in a primary music ensemble, Director approval

Percussion Ensemble is an instrumental music-performing group that is meant to further the development of playing techniques for marching, percussion, mallet, and auxiliary instruments. Participation by playing either a prepared solo or ensemble is a requirement for this course as well as performing at a concert at the end of the each semester.

#### **Concert Band**

1 credit

**Grades 9** 

**Regular Grading Scale** 

**Prerequisite:** Director Approval

The Concert Band is an instrumental music-performing group that will participate in concerts, chapel programs, music festivals, contests, and other school or community events. Participation outside of the regular school day is required and will be part of the grade. Pep band is required by selected members of the Concert Band and they will be expected to perform at selected home football and basketball events. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1st semester.

#### **Symphonic Band**

1 credit

Grades 10, 11, 12

**Regular Grading Scale** 

Prerequisite: Director Approval

This is a focused music-performing ensemble developing excellence through performance. They will participate in concerts, chapel programs, music festivals, contests, and other school or community events. Participation outside of the regular school day is required and will be part of the grade. Incoming 9th graders who were in Concert Band as an 8th grader have the opportunity to audition into this ensemble. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1st semester.

#### **Honors Wind Ensemble**

1 credit

Grades 9, 10, 11, 12

**Honors Grading Scale** 

**Prerequisites:** Audition only

This is a focused and intense music-performing ensemble developing excellence in performance. They will participate in concerts, chapel programs, music festivals, contests, and other school or community events. Participation outside of the regular school day is required and will be part of the grade. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1st semester.

#### **Concert Orchestra**

1 credit

Grades 9 (includes MS 8<sup>th</sup> grade)

**Regular Grading Scale** 

Concert orchestra is an intermediate string ensemble for eighth and ninth grade students. As part of this class students will continue to develop intonation skills while learning more complex rhythmic patterns, time signatures, and multiple new key signatures. Students will also be introduced to higher positions (III position, IV position for cello), shifting, harmonics, and beginning vibrato. Concert orchestra performs at the KMEA large ensemble festival at the grade 3 level. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1st semester.

Serenade Orchestra 1 credit Grades 10, 11, 12

#### **Regular Grading Scale**

Serenade orchestra is an advancing string ensemble for tenth through twelfth grade students. Ninth grade students who study privately may audition for placement in this group. As part of this class students will begin to refine intonation in various keys. Students at this level are comfortable playing in and shifting to III position (IV position and extensions for cello) and are beginning to apply that knowledge in more advanced concert literature. Serenade orchestra performs at the KMEA large ensemble festival at the grade 4 level. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1<sup>st</sup> semester.

#### **Honors Chamber Orchestra**

1 credit

**Grades 10, 11, 12** 

**Honors Grading Scale** 

Prerequisite: Audition only and Director Approval

Honors Chamber orchestra is an advanced string ensemble for tenth through twelfth grades. Students are admitted into Chamber Orchestra through audition and director approval. Students at this level are comfortable with III and V position (III IV cello) and basses play across strings in addition to higher shifting. These students have developed a polished vibrato and display flexibility in right wrist and fingers allowing for more advanced bow techniques such as spiccato and legato. Honors Chamber orchestra performs at the KMEA large ensemble festival at the grade 5-6 level. A music fee of \$50 will be assessed during the 1<sup>st</sup> semester.

Conducting 1 credit Grades 11, 12

**Regular Grading Scale** 

Prerequisites: Band, Choir or Orchestra

The course is designed to expand and define the mechanical skills developed, particularly baton technique, usage of the left hand in conducting, and a deeper understanding of the musical score. In addition, attention is given to score preparation, to the understanding of transposition, rehearsal techniques, interpretation, and to the entire process of non-verbal communication necessary for successful communication as a conductor.

Group Piano 1 credit

Grades 9,10,11,12

**Regular Grading Scale** 

**Prerequisite:** *Must be enrolled in the School of the Arts and in a primary music ensemble, Director Approval* Group Piano is an opportunity for students within the School of the Arts to learn basic piano, music theory and performance skills. This course is meant to allow students the opportunity to prepare for group piano requirements as a college music major.

Jazz Band 1/2 credit Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 Regular Grading Scale

**Prerequisites:** Director Approval

The Jazz Band is an instrumental music group that meets before school on Tuesday and Thursday. The group will be expected to play in concerts, chapel programs, music festivals, contests, and other school or community events. Participation outside of regular school day will be required and graded.

This course does not meet during the regular school day, but <u>before</u> school two mornings a week and <u>cannot be</u> <u>selected during online registration</u>. Students will be scheduled manually after auditions.

Honors Jazz Band 1/2 credit Grades 11, 12

**Honors Grading Scale** 

Prerequisites: Audition and Director Approval

The Honors Jazz Band will be the elite instrumental music group that meets before school on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The group will be expected to play in concerts, chapel programs, music festivals, contests, and other school or community events. Participation outside of regular school day will be required and graded. A paper covering course topics such as jazz theory, improvisation, history and transformation of jazz will be required.

This course does not meet during the regular school day, but <u>before</u> school to three mornings a week and <u>cannot</u> <u>be selected during online registration</u>. Students will be scheduled manually after auditions.

Music History 1 credit Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 Regular Grading Scale

Students will be engaged in a walk through musical history. Starting with early music B.C. all the way to today's most popular hits. The course aims to widen the musical horizons and receptiveness of the standard listener, making him/her a more understanding listener to radio, television, and professional concerts. Dual Credit Opportunity.

AP Music Theory 1 credit Grades 11, 12 AP Grading Scale

**Prerequisites:** A or B in Music Theory and History or teacher approval

AP Music Theory is an in-depth look into ways of understanding and making music on a collegiate level. In this class we will review the basics of reading music and take an integrated approach to harmony, ear training, and compositional techniques which will better prepare students for not only the AP college exam but also the entrance exam for any college music department. A testing fee is charged for this course.

## **Fundamentals of Art**

1 credit

#### Regular Grading Scale

Fundamentals of Art explores the basics of drawing, painting, ceramics, and print making while satisfying the state required art credit. Projects will focus on these mediums while incorporating art history and practical handson application of art theories and procedures. A fee is charged for this course.

Visual Arts Foundations (Visual Arts Track) 1 credit

**Regular Grading Scale** 

Prerequisite: Portfolio and teacher recommendation required

Visual Arts Foundations is structured like the Fundamentals of Art, but is developed for those students pursuing the Visual Arts Diploma and/or desire a more advanced pace. 8th graders pursuing the Visual Arts Track for high school will work with the middle school art teacher prior to scheduling. Current high school freshman can submit a portfolio to the High School Department Chair for approval. A fee is charged for this course.

#### **Advanced Drawing & Painting**

1 credit

**Honors Grading Scale** 

**Prerequisite:** Visual Arts Foundations, or portfolio submission and teacher recommendation from Fundamentals of Art

Advanced Drawing and Painting is an in depth investigation of advanced drawing and painting techniques and mediums. Various artists and historical movements will be incorporated. Students will explore new mediums

while learning to incorporate concept, developing work that is self-expressive. In depth multi-process work will be a focus as students begin to build their portfolios. The course is taught in a studio type setting. A fee is charged for this course.

#### **Ceramics & Sculpture**

1 credit

**Regular Grading Scale** 

**Prerequisite**: Fundamentals of Art

This class is taught in a studio setting and designed for students interested in 3D exploration. Students will build upon skills learned in Fundamentals or Visual Art Foundations to increase their level of mastery in additive and subtractive sculptural techniques. Ceramics work will include hand building and wheel-throwing. Other materials used may include, but are not limited to: wire, plaster, wood, and found objects/recycled materials. Students will create a variety of functional and conceptual pieces that will develop a strong 3D portfolio for use in competitions, AP, and/or college portfolios. A fee is charged for this course.

#### Mixed Media Studio

1 credit

**Regular Grading Scale** 

Prerequisite: Fundamentals of Art or Visual Arts Foundations

This class is taught in a studio setting and is designed for students who want to explore a variety of materials and experience a wide range of art-making processes. Students will follow multi-step processes and learn to unify various materials for purposeful concept and design. Experiences may include, but are not limited to: fabric dyeing, printmaking, embroidery, drawing, painting, and assemblage. The work students produce will serve to increase variety in portfolios submitted to competitions, the AP exam, and/or colleges. A fee is charged for this course.

#### +AP Studio Drawing

1 credit

**AP Grading Scale** 

**Prerequisites:** Fundamentals of Art or Visual Arts Foundations, AND Advanced Drawing and Painting \*Completion of Summer Homework is required for admission

AP Studio Drawing is taught in a studio setting at the college level. Students will work toward mastery of skills while exploring advanced media and mark-making techniques. Students will apply concept, meaning, and intent as they build their portfolios. Students will submit a portfolio to the College Board to qualify for college credit in the spring. A supply and testing fee is charged for this course.

#### +AP 3D Design

1 credit

#### **AP Grading Scale**

**Prerequisites**: Fundamentals of Art or Visual Arts Foundations AND Ceramics & Sculpture **Recommended**: Mixed Media Studio\* Completion of Summer Homework is required for admission

This class is taught at the college level in a studio setting. AP 3D explores the elements and principles of design as they pertain to building form and shaping space. Students will master previous building techniques and explore advanced processes including, but not limited to: casting, glass fusing, and installation, while applying concept, meaning, and intent in Portfolio development. Students will submit a portfolio to the College Board to qualify for college credit in the spring. A supply and testing fee will be charged for this course.

#### +AP 2D Design:

Drawing/Painting-based

1 credit

**AP Grading Scale** 

**Prerequisites:** Fundamentals of Art or Visual Arts Foundations AND Advanced Drawing & Painting. **Recommended:** AP Studio Drawing \*Completion of Summer Homework is required for Admission AP 2-D Design is taught in a studio setting at the college level. AP 2-D Design explores the use of the elements and principles of art as they define composition. Drawing, painting and other mark-making medium skills are

expected to combine with concept to create higher level process art. Students will submit a portfolio to the College Board to qualify for college credit in the spring. A supply and testing fee will be charged for this course.

AP 2D Design: Digital

1 credit

**AP Grading Scale** 

**Prerequisites**: Fundamentals of Art or Visual Arts Foundations AND Digital Photography **Recommended**: Graphic Design \*Completion of Summer Homework is required for Admission

AP 2-D Design is taught in a studio setting at the college level. AP 2-D Design Digital explores the use of the elements and principles of art as they define composition. Digital art, photography, mixed media, and other design media will combine with concept to create higher level process art. Students will submit a portfolio to the College Board to qualify for college credit in the spring. A supply and testing fee will be charged for this course.

#### **Digital Photography**

1 credit

#### **Regular Grading Scale**

**Prerequisite:** Fundamentals of Art or Visual Arts Foundations

This course provides a thorough investigation of photography as an art form. Students will learn about the history of photography, DSLR camera functions and fundamentals, various photographic techniques and composition skills, and post-production editing using Photoshop CC. Students will have several opportunities to practice camera skills and techniques during class, but will work independently outside of class time on shoot assignments. Time management and development of good work ethics is crucial to using lab time effectively to meet project deadlines. **Equipment required:** Students are responsible for providing their own DSLR camera, and SD card. A fee is charged for this course.

#### **Graphic Design**

1 credit

#### **Regular Grading Scale**

Prerequisite: Fundamentals of Art or Visual Arts Foundations

This course provides a comprehensive overview of visual design using digital media. Students will use the Adobe Creative Cloud to create graphics suitable for print and web applications. Students will learn how graphics in advertising are used to promote ideas through project-based assignments, as well as the tools and techniques needed to build a fully functioning website. Time management and development of good work ethics is crucial to using lab time effectively to meet project deadlines. A fee is charged for this course.

#### **Portfolio Studio**

1 Credit

#### Regular Grading Scale

**Prerequisite:** CONCURRENTLY taken with an AP Art Class or, for a Senior Visual Art student who has completed 2 AP Art Classes

Portfolio Studio is offered only to students who are currently taking an AP Art Class or to a Senior who has already taken 2 AP classes and wishes to develop their portfolio for college admission and/or scholarship opportunities such as Scholastic Arts. A fee is charged for this course.

## **Concert Requirements**

Part of being an excellent musician is knowing how to also be a good audience member and to know what behavior is acceptable and unacceptable at any public concert.

- 1. All music students are expected to be in attendance for all concerts in which they are performing. If there is a conflict with another school event, it is the responsibility of the student/parent to inform the director at least 2 weeks prior. The director will handle all schedule conflicts on a case by case to determine whether the absence will be excused or unexcused. Absences due to illness or family emergency will be excused, but please inform the director prior to the concert, if possible. Absences due to athletic practices and regular season games will not be excused. In the case of tournament games, senior nights and final games of the season, the director will attempt to work around the conflict so that the student is able to participate in both. Any unexcused absence will result in a grade no higher than a 60% for that concert.
- 2. Students are expected to attend the concert in its entirety. If a student needs to leave a concert early (or arrive late), he/she must receive prior approval (requests should be made in writing). If not approved, students will not receive full credit for the concert if they are not there for the entire duration of the evening.
- 3. Students will sit with their ensemble group for the duration of the performance. Students observed in the hallways or classrooms during a performance will receive a lower grade and possibly disciplinary action.
- 4. If you need to exit during the concert, please do so only between pieces. Leaving while a group is performing is distracting, not only to the audience but to the performers as well.
- 5. The use of any and all electronic devices is not permitted during a concert. Any electronic device seen during a concert will be confiscated.
- 6. Please refrain from talking while a group is performing or while anyone is addressing the audience.

# **Dress Code Requirements for all Performances**

Concert dress uniforms are ordered through the school. The uniform consists of black pants, black shirt, and black tie for the guys, and long black dresses for the girls. The guys will also wear solid black socks and black shoes that have no visible logo. The girls should wear black, closed-toe shoes. No dangling jewelry will be accepted. Failure to comply with the dress code, without prior discussion with the Director of the School of the Arts or your ensemble director, may result in the student not being allowed to perform with the ensemble and he or she will not receive their full concert grade.

Some secondary ensembles have their own dress code requirements but all fall within the Christian Academy of Louisville School System Handbook for dress code requirements.

For all other School of the Arts sponsored events (such as Solo and Ensemble Festival, All State auditions and rehearsals, spring trips, and SOA recitals), students are expected to comply with the dress code requirements as stated in the Christian Academy of Louisville Handbook. Directors reserve the right to interpret when dress is in violation of code and to address the student as needed. Failure to comply with the dress code will result in an hour of detention, and in some cases the student may not be allowed to perform.

### **Governor's School for the Arts**

The Governors School for the Arts provides hands-on arts opportunities for the state's talented high school students who are dancers, actors, instrumental and vocal musicians, creative writers, future architects, or visual artists. GSA is a three-week summer program for rising juniors and seniors in the state of Kentucky. The program is located at the University of Kentucky in Lexington and is free for students to attend. Most universities in the state, and several in other states, offer scholarships to GSA alumni covering portions of tuition costs. For more information on GSA please speak with your Ensemble Director or Mr. Wooten in the Music Office.

Governor's School for the Arts is an optional audition opportunity for all Sophomores and Juniors within the School of the Arts.

## **Miscellaneous Policy and Procedures**

Instruments should only be stored within the appropriate classroom of your primary ensemble. No instruments should ever be stored in the hallway.

The Music office opens each day by no later than 7:45 a.m. Students are not allowed in the music department area without a music staff member present.

The Music office closes each day by 4:00 p.m. Once the ensemble directors have left his or her rehearsal rooms, those areas are closed and students are not allowed in the room.

We do offer some private lessons on campus, and private lessons from our approved instructors are offered within the department. An ensemble director does not have to be present for these private lessons.
