David had nothing to be sorry for and nothing left to give. Having presided over many funerals and having offered counsel to families whom have lost or are losing a loved one, it is always heartbreaking when the last days, or words for that matter, need be spent on forgiveness and apologies. To live an entire life only to have to seek forgiveness in its last hour is no way to depart. No matter what you leave your children, remember this, you have one life so don't waste it. Live in such a way that regret and sorrow will not haunt your final days.
