## LOOKING AHEAD

Christian Academy School System moves closer to the anticipated opening of the new Junior Academy building at the English Station Campus and Middle School building at the Indiana Campus.

**ENGLISH STATION JUNIOR ACADEMY** 

INDIANA MIDDLE SCHOOL

#### **OUR ACADEMIC EXPANSIONS ARE COMING!**

Expansion and growth, both bricks and mortar – plus eager young minds anxious to learn – will become a reality with the opening of two new facilities joining the Christian Academy School System: The Junior Academy Building at our English Station Campus and the Christian Academy of Indiana Middle School at the Indiana Campus.

The projects were part of Christian Academy's capital campaign which was delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic; nevertheless, both are now moving forward. The Junior Academy building will allow for a much greater learning environment with the current outdoor cottages removed, as well as the classrooms for young students integrated back into the main building making for a holistic learning experience plus enjoyable and important student interaction. The new middle school will not only allow for the increase of up to 300 middle school students but will also allow for an increase in the capacity of the high school.

English Station's new 13,000 square-foot, stand-alone building will be located in the open area next to the second campus entrance and elementary building. It will house CAL's Junior Academy program for three and four-year-old students and will include eight state-of-the-art classrooms; a multi-purpose room; a new enclosed outdoor playground; separate drop-off and pick-up lanes; a conference room, new offices and a warming kitchen. The stand-alone, 17,000 square-foot middle school will be located in the open area adjacent to the cafeteria on the east side of the Indiana Campus, connected to the existing facilities. Amenities will include 18 new classrooms; new innovative and modern offices, a media center and lobby; dedicated space for middle school administration, faculty and staff and a 1,000 square-foot extension of the cafeteria.

"The English Station and Indiana projects are a serious commitment to our ongoing evolution as a leading U.S. faith-based academic institution here to raise up the next generation of Christian leaders and Christ-followers," states Superintendent Darin Long. "We've come a long way since CAL was established back in 1976 and are thrilled to offer these 'new era' facilities for our students, their parents, our dedicated faculty and administration."




#### AMY McCONNELL **ENGLISH STATION CAMPUS**





#### ALASKA


Several years ago, Matt Wooten, our Director of the School of the Arts, began praying about making missions more of an emphasis in his programs and among the lives of his students. After getting together with our Director of Missions, Ace Hubbard, they both began praying about what a trip tailored to our students in our Visual and Performing Arts Program might look like. This past June nine of our students along with Tammy Cusick, our Visual Arts Department Chair, Matt Wooten and Ace Hubbard ventured to Talkeenta, Alaska, to see how the Lord would answer the prayers of the years before. Our team partnered with a local church where they beautifully constructed and painted seven different projects, including a massive wall mural for the children's ministry. Our performing arts students had the opportunity to lead worship and do a special home visit where they played worship music for a terminally ill cancer patient who hadn't gotten the chance to leave home for months. While all of these activities were thoroughly loved, the activity the team enjoyed the most was hosting a children's outreach event that gave them the chance to create relationships through art projects, games and pure chaos. What an incredible first time mission trip that we hope to continue into the future!

#### **POLAND**

Near the end of June the excitement peaks as we prepare to send a team to Poland every year where they partner with Proem Ministries. Our partnership with Proem Ministries is one of our most cherished and long-standing partnerships and we love sending them teams. In fact, this past summer we sent an incredibly talented team full of first time Poland team members who are determined to make sure they are on next year's team as well. They had the extreme privilege of leading children ages 5-11 in activities like American football, basketball, baseball, futbol (soccer), yard games, rock climbing and more. Not to mention they got to participate in craft making, singing, dancing and of course the crazy fun opening and closing sessions every day. Our teams help clean up after every meal and ensure all the children are safe throughout the day. We were overwhelmed to hear that 110 children made professions of faith during our team's time at camp in Poland and rejoice in knowing they will be with us in Heaven one day!

#### LOCAL MISSIONS

Our Local Missions Club exists to help our high school students become more familiar with the needs and organizations that care for those in our own community of Louisville, Kentucky. Throughout the year, students meet twice a month at school with our leader, Ms. Amy McConnell (HS Bible Teacher). During the first meeting of the month they learn more about that month's organization/partner. During the second meeting of the month they are either serving with them or making plans to serve with them. This past year we partnered with Scarlet Hope through education and cooking two meals that could be taken with those who go on outreaches. We also partnered with Lifeline Ministry by packing meals. We served the Thanksgiving meal with Lost Sheep who serves the homeless and we partnered with our fourth grade classes during the beloved Mountain Santa event in December. We also had the pleasure of working with Shively Baptist during a Nepali Refugee Outreach event and with Love City as they helped to clean up some homes in the West End.





#### INDIANA CAMPUS

#### **POLAND**

In July, we sent a team to Zakosciele, Poland, to serve with Proem ministries. The team spent the week serving at a children's camp by conducting craft workshops, sports and games clubs, hanging-out with kids and doing cafeteria clean up. The campers attended morning and evening worship services each day. Many children made personal decisions for Christ during the week!

#### **HONDURAS**

During spring break we sent a team to Honduras where we were able to partner with the Iglesia Evangélica de Santidad (Evangelical Holiness Church) in La Paz. We shared the Gospel and our personal testimonies to groups of children in local schools, served homeless and hungry children at the Sueños y Sonrisas ministry and participated in worship with the church and at Sueños y Sonrisas.

#### **REGIONAL MISSIONS**

This summer, a group of students headed to Lynch, KY to serve with Meridzo ministries in the impoverished Appalachian region of Kentucky. We served the community by hosting events and doing work projects for our ministry partner. It was great to see our students caring for others and oftentimes going out of their comfort zones to be the hands and feet of Jesus!

#### **SOUTHWEST CAMPUS**

#### CHANGE FOR CHRIST

Southwest students and staff contributed \$1,969 last year through two separate missions emphasis weeks - Change the World for Christ and Change the USA for Christ. During those two weeks, we had specific prayer focuses for each day related to international and local missions and students donated \$1 each day to dress in the theme for that specific day.

#### **OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD**

Southwest students and staff collected 341 shoebox gifts for Operation Christmas Child in 2022. We were so thankful to once again have the opportunity to bring our shoebox gifts as a school family and pray over them before they were transported to the local collection site. The enthusiasm and commitment to this service project is such a blessing to witness as our youngest junior academy students to our oldest middle school students are all able to participate together in sharing the Gospel with children around the world.

#### YOU "CAN" MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Southwest students and staff donated 662 canned goods and non-perishable items to the Food
Pantry of Beechland Baptist Church. This is our service project each February to assist in restocking
Beechland's food pantry after the holidays.

#### **ENGLISH STATION CAMPUS**

#### SCHOOL OF THE ARTS

Our School of the Arts had the ONLY Symphony Orchestra in the state to participate in the KMEA Large Ensemble District Festival and they received a Distinguished Rating. We also had 30 students make either the All-State Band, Choir or Orchestra. Five students received the Governor's School for the Arts Awards in Musical Theatre, Visual Art, Vocal Music and Instrumental Music Brass.

#### MARCHING BAND

The Marching Centurions began their season with a 2nd place finish at the Bands of America Obetz, OH Regional in Class A, which is the highest finish the Marching Centurions has ever had at a national competition. In their first state competition of the season at the Beechwood Festival of Bands, the band won Best Percussion and earned 2nd place in Class AA. The band finished in 3rd place in the KMEA Regional Competition for Class AA and won Best Overall Visual Performance. They then ended their state competition with a 7th place finish in the KMEA Marching Band Championships in Class AA. The show was entitled "Sanctuary" and took our audience through a church service of Prelude, Welcome, Offertory, Message and Benediction.

#### BAND

Two middle school band students made the KBO (KY Band Organization) All-State Band, along with nine high school band students and eight middle school band students who made the District 5 All-District Band. There were also four high school students in the District 5 All-District Jazz and Percussion Ensemble. Out of 21 events in Solo and Ensemble for Band, 19 events received a Distinguished Rating.

#### CHOIR

While in Chicago the Honors Chorale received Best Overall Choir Award and Show Choir received Best Overall Specialty Choir Award. The 6th, 7th and 8th Grade Concert Women's and Honors Chorale Choirs all received Distinguished Ratings at KMEA Large Ensemble District Festival.

#### **ORCHESTRA**

In December, the Orchestra spent the day in area nursing homes playing in various ensembles for the residents. Our Choir traveled to East-End neighborhoods to carol for the communities, spreading the joy of Christmas to others.

There were 74 events in Solo and Ensemble for Orchestra and ALL 74 events received a Distinguished Rating.

#### DRAMA

The theme for the 2022-2023 season of Dramaticals was "Call to Adventure," inspired by the message of Jeremiah 33:3. In the fall we performed the classic tale of, 'Alice in Wonderland," followed in the spring by the favorite Disney musical, 'The Little Mermaid.' We were privileged to be one of only two schools in Kentucky with multiple seniors honored as Governor School of the Arts musical theater participants. Over 3,300 people attended the shows. As they said farewell, we welcomed in dozens of new cast members and look forward to continually finding our identity in glorifying an Audience of One.

#### BAND

Our CAI bands are exploding in both numbers and excitement! From Gold at the Group 1 level in the advanced band, all the way through the 6th graders' first ISSMA performance, all the bands received amazing comments and accolades. Our fall concert was held at the New Albany Amphitheater for all of our 6th-12th students. What a cool chance to perform out in our community at a beautiful venue. One pianist and 9 vocalists performed at the State ISSMA Solo and Ensemble Festival, receiving extremely high marks from the judges, 3 being "With Distinction."

In March and April the middle and high school choirs sang at the local ISSMA Choral Festival and received amazing comments from judges and very high ratings. The High School Choir received gold ratings in their performance in addition to their sight reading! Chamber Singers received gold in performance and sight reading and was within 1.5 points from a perfect score, earning the "With Distinction" rating.

The students' love for singing and their striving for excellence in how they prepare and perform music was evident in all concerts, giving God the glory through their singing and worship of Him. Lilly Koenig - Class of 2018








Nathan Paris - Class of 2018
