Summer gives us an opportunity to catch up on reading for fun, as well as spend time doing fun activities with our families. Our “Old MacDonald Had a Book” Summer Reading Program is optional, but everyone is encouraged to participate.

- Students entering **kindergarten through second grade** will color in one space on the GAME BOARD for each book read.
- **Students entering grades 3-5** will color one space for each 30 minutes read.
- Additionally, **at the end of the summer**, all students may color one space for each completed enrichment activity on your GAME BOARD.

Reading can be counted as reading alone, reading to someone/something, being read to, and listening to audio books. You can also count the books/time completed for another reading program for this reading program, as well.

Students who complete all 40 spaces in the “**Old MacDonald Had a Book**” **Summer Reading Program** will be recognized and rewarded. These students will attend a special visit from the Mobile Dairy Classroom with a real cow, a reading badge to add to your shelfmarker in the library, a free pass to see a movie at Sauerbeck Family Drive In, and more!! (Exact date of the celebration will be announced after school starts).

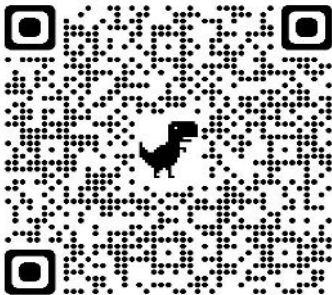
- To encourage the pleasure of reading and related activities

Summer Reading Program - Enrichment Activities

Color **one space** on the game board & check the appropriate box when you complete an activity.

	Participate in another summer reading program. Turn in proof of participation.
	Do 10 family devotions. List the dates on a piece of paper & turn in.
	Participate in a summer service project (pet sit a friend's pet, take donations to a shelter, etc.) & turn in a photo.
	Read a book with a FARM word (barn, farmer, scarecrow, cow, etc.) in the title. Write your name, the title of the book, and a short review of the book on a notecard to turn in.
	Visit a Free Little Library - Either one in your neighborhood or while you are on vacation. Take a picture of you donating and/or choosing a new book to include in this packet or email to Mrs. Neyhart.
	Build a barn out of aluminum foil, paper, toilet paper tubes, etc. What kind of animals would you put in your barn? Make them, too! Turn in a photo of your barn or email it to Mrs. Neyhart.
	Go to your kitchen and make a list of at least 10 items that you can find that are made from crops or farm animals. Turn in your list.
	Attend Vacation Bible School. Location: _____
	Make a word search puzzle based on farm-related words or a farm-related wordle. Go to abcya.com and search for "word search creator" if making a word search or search for "word cloud" if making a wordle. Print and turn in.

Spend some time exploring the digital activities. On a note card name your favorite activity and explain why it was your favorite. 	Read Psalm 79:13. Write your own poem or song praising Jesus for being our Good Shepherd. Turn in a copy of your poem/song.
	<p>Research "Fun Facts About Farms" from the CASS library website:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Go to the website: www.caschools.us. Hover over "Quicklinks". b. Click on "Destiny/Library Research." c. Choose your campus link → click the catalog tab on top. d. Click on WebPath Express found on the left side. → Type in "Fun Facts About Farms" in the search box. e. Choose an article from the search results. List 3 of your favorite facts from the article and turn them in.
	Create your own farm themed comic strip on paper or using a digital tool like Google Slides. Turn in your comic strip.
	Write an acrostic poem for the word FARM. Turn it in.
	Take a poll among family, friends, and neighbors to find out what their favorite farm animal is. Turn in the results.
	Look up Bible passages relating to fruits/plants, harvests, or farm animals. Make 4 bookmarks illustrating your favorite verses & turn them in.
	Take a picture of yourself reading in a creative way keeping the farm theme in mind. Turn it in or email to Mrs. Neyhart.
	Listen to an audiobook. Write the title and author of the book on an index card and turn it in.
	Keeping the theme in mind, be creative and come up with your own enrichment activity! Turn in proof by way of photos, drawings or writing.
