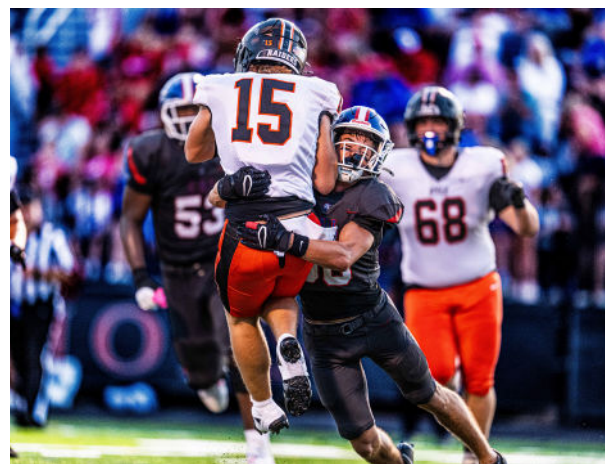

FLIP THE SCRIPT

Let's "flip the script" this week and talk about CAL's incredible defense first. In the first four games of the regular season this unit allowed just 21 points.

Friday night, CAL's defense saw 15 different players record a tackle on the Ryle Raiders. Senior Captain Micah Newsome led the defensive charge with six total tackles, including four solo stops and an impressive three tackles for loss totaling eight yards. Junior Noah Perkins was right behind him with four tackles and another tackle for loss, while sophomore Eli Hare added three tackles to the

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defensive effort.

FREIGHT TRAIN

Ryle's QB had an unfortunate introduction to junior Johnny Tully early in the game. Tully had no problem getting around the Raider line before lowering the boom on the quarterback with a hit that had both of the quarterback's feet flying off the turf, before bringing him crashing back down. The sack, that is probably still being felt, resulted in an 11 yard loss for the Raiders.

NOT ON WESCOTT'S WATCH

With two minutes left in the game the Raiders were desperately wanting to get on the board. However, sophomore Brody Wescott was not going to allow that. Ryle's QB dropped back deep to throw a Hail Mary to a Raider receiver, who was perfectly covered by junior Noah Martin. Wescott saw his opportunity, stepped in front of the pass, and came down with the interception, giving the ball right back to the Centurions at their own 21 yard line and putting an exclamation point on CAL's 49-0 shutout.

PUTTING ON A SHOW

Junior Captain Jackson Burke kept the Homecoming crowd on their feet Friday night with another impressive performance. Burke was 21 for 24 on the night for 301 yards and six touchdowns. Those six touchdowns were handed out to five different Centurions, leaving the Raiders constantly guessing who would have the ball next.

HAHN GOT THE PARTY STARTED

Midway through the first quarter junior Carson Hahn got the Homecoming party started with the first TD of the night. Hahn found himself in perfect position to catch a three yard pass from Burke that fired up the packed stands. Even covered by Raiders, Burke knew Hahn would bring the ball down for six. This trip was even sweeter for Hahn as it marked his first touchdown of the varsity season.

OFF TO THE RACES

Another varsity "first" came early in the second quarter when junior Aaron Soete made his own "run for the roses" by hauling in the longest reception of the night. Looking more like Secretariat coming down the stretch, Soete blew by the Raider coverage, dropped it into high gear, and raced to the end zone for a 67 yard touchdown. **#1 FOR A REASON**

Senior Captain Ja'hyde Brown continued to put on a show for the Centurion Faithfuls and alumni Friday night. Brown was perfect on the night, catching all eight rockets fired his way from Burke for 108 yards and two touchdowns. Brown averaged 13.5 yards per catch, with his longest reception going for 45 yards.

TWICE AS NICE

Senior Garyon Hobbs found more than one way to put points on the board Friday night! Hobbs led the Centurions' rushing attack with 23 yards on six carries, including a 14 yard run, and punched one into the end zone for a rushing touchdown. But why settle for one? Hobbs also hauled in a six yard touchdown pass from Burke, giving the senior two touchdowns on the night, one on the ground and one through the air.

TEAM EFFORT

Football is a team sport and nothing can be accomplished without everyone's hard work. Junior Gabriel Lumpkin helped bump up CAL's score with a 12 yard reception that ended in the end zone while senior Andrew Greene caught both of his targets for 38 yards, averaging 19 yards per reception. Junior Jayden Leak added a 12 yard catch and senior Trevor McDill pulled down two passes for another 10 yards.

HAPPY FEET

Seven touchdowns meant plenty of work for CAL's kicking crew Friday night. Senior Madden Miller and sophomore Noah Gividen were perfect when points were on the line. The

pair combined to go a flawless 7-for-7 on PATs, making sure CAL collected every extra point available in the 49-0 Homecoming win.

Miller handled five of those extra points, going a perfect 5-for-5, while Gividen knocked through both of his attempts to finish 2-for-2.

The duo also kept their legs busy on kickoffs, combining for 458 yards on eight kicks with five touchbacks. Gividen sent four of his six kickoffs into the end zone for touchbacks, while Miller added another on his two attempts.

THURSDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

CAL has a shorter turnaround this week as they travel to Cecilia on Thursday night to take on the Central Hardin Bruins. The Bruins have had a rough start to their year but our Centurions know better than to take any opponent lightly. CAL has their sights firmly set on playing at Kroger Field in December and knows anything can happen under the Friday – or Thursday – night lights.

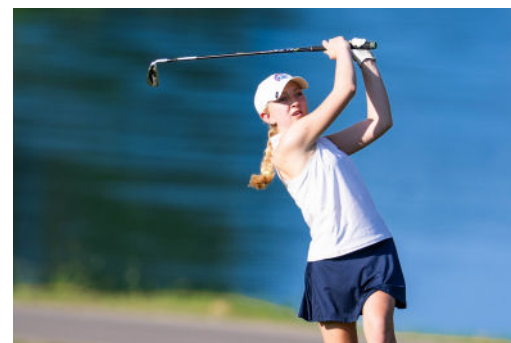

5th/6th football falls in defensive battle at PRP

The Christian Academy of Louisville Juniors went toe-to-toe with the PRP Panthers in a physical defensive battle Saturday at PRP Field, holding the Panthers scoreless through three quarters before ultimately falling just short, 7-6.

PRP received the opening kickoff and started at its own 45-yard line, but the CAL defense immediately made its presence felt. Big Tristan Ball stuffed

the first play from scrimmage at the line before Carter Lee tracked down a nine-yard run on second down. Gavin Ihnen and Bryson Hamilton combined to stop the next run after PRP moved the chains.

Ihnen came up with another impressive play moments later, shedding his blocker and making a solo tackle in the open field. Then the CAL defense produced the game's first turnover as

Johnny Newsome stepped in front of a third-down pass for an interception.

The Centurions took over at their own 17 and quickly showed some explosiveness of their own. Quarterback Miles Johnston connected with Ihnen on a screen pass that went for 20 yards and a first down. Preston Burge followed with a misdirection run for another 20, moving CAL across mid-

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-field to the PRP 46.

The promising drive eventually stalled, however, with CAL turning the ball over on downs and the game remaining scoreless as the second quarter began.

PRP responded with a long, methodical drive, but the CAL defense refused to break. Burge made multiple tackles during the possession as the Panthers worked their way down the field. The drive ultimately ended with an incomplete pass on fourth down, giving the football back to CAL with 2:23 remaining in the half.

Johnston showed good pocket awareness on the ensuing possession, escaping pressure and finding Hamilton for a five-yard completion. CAL eventually faced fourth down, where Johnston kept it himself but was stopped just short of the line to gain.

That gave PRP one final opportunity with 34 seconds remaining, but Alex Edison and Burge came up with tackles to help ensure the Panthers couldn't capitalize.

Halftime: CAL 0, PRP 0.

CAL started the second half at midfield after Burge secured PRP's onside-kick attempt, and the Centurions immediately put together their best offensive drive of the afternoon.

Edison took the first-down carry and turned what appeared to be a short gain into nine yards, slipping through multiple defenders to set up second-

and-short.

Then Johnston went deep.

He launched a ball down the right sideline for Lee, who made a spectacular catch downfield to move the Centurions all the way to the PRP 20. Johnston followed with another completion to Hamilton to reach the 15-yard line. On second-and-five, Johnston dumped a screen to Edison, and Edison did the rest. He made multiple Panthers miss in space and fought his way into the end zone for the game's first touchdown.

The extra point was unsuccessful, but CAL had finally broken the deadlock and led 6-0 with four minutes remaining in the third quarter.

PRP went back to work, but the Centurion defense continued to make the Panthers earn every yard. Beckham Albright made a first-down tackle, Newsome and Burge combined for another stop, and Hamilton added a tackle on second down.

The third quarter ended with CAL still protecting its 6-0 lead and PRP threatening deep in Centurion territory. The fourth quarter opened with Avery Denton making a stop at the 7-yard line. John Beau Morrison followed with another big tackle at the 1, but PRP finally managed to punch the ball across the goal line on the next play. The Panthers converted the extra point, giving PRP its first lead of the afternoon, 7-6.

CAL's next possession went nowhere, and the Centurions turned the ball over on downs with 5:30 remaining. With PRP holding the football and protecting a one-point lead, CAL needed its defense to make one more play. It did.

On third down, PRP completed a screen pass, but the ball came loose and Hamilton recovered the fumble, giving the Centurions new life and one final opportunity to win the game.

Johnston immediately connected with Edison for a 20-yard gain, moving CAL to the PRP 48 with 3:20 remaining. Edison took the handoff on the next play and picked up another eight yards as the Centurions continued to march.

CAL eventually faced fourth-and-five with its season-long toughness on display. Johnston's hard count got PRP to jump, drawing the Panthers offsides and giving the Centurions a huge first down.

With approximately one minute remaining, CAL had a fresh set of downs at the PRP 40 and a chance to complete the comeback.

But the final drive ended in heartbreak. PRP intercepted a CAL pass, allowing the Panthers to go into victory formation and escape with the one-point win. Final: PRP 7, Christian Academy 6.

3rd/4th football rolls past PRP

CAL Pee Wee Rolls Past PRP, 41-6
The Christian Academy of Louisville Pee Wee Centurions turned in a dominant all-around performance Saturday at PRP Stadium, jumping out early and never looking back in a 41-6 victory over PRP.

PRP received the opening kickoff, but the CAL defense immediately set the tone, forcing a four-and-out and giving the Centurions excellent field position near the PRP 40-yard line.

CAL wasted no time taking advantage. Christian Sheehan opened the possession with a 15-yard run before Ryan Clark took a jet sweep around the edge for another first down. A steady dose of Sheehan on direct snaps moved the Centurions inside the 5-yard line, where Sheehan followed the blocking of Luke Thayer and Jack Dudgeon around the left side and into the end zone.

The extra point was unsuccessful,

giving CAL an early 6-0 lead.

PRP answered on its next possession. Madden Johnston recorded a first-down tackle before PRP eventually broke a run around the right side for a touchdown to even the score at 6-6. Mitchell Flynn came up with a big stop on the extra-point attempt to keep the game tied.

That tie didn't last long.

Tyson Lawyer fielded the ensuing

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kickoff, setting CAL up at its own 45. Just two plays later, Sheehan took a direct snap, burst straight through the middle of the PRP defense and raced to the end zone to put the Centurions back in front, 12-6.

CAL then stole a possession to begin the second quarter. Silas McReynolds dropped a perfectly placed onside kick into no-man's land, and Leyton Howard recovered it to put the Centurions right back on offense.

The drive eventually faced third-and-20, but quarterback Matthew McKinney delivered. McKinney found Sheehan on a slant, and Sheehan picked up the first down and more to move CAL to the PRP 29.

From there, Sheehan ran for eight yards and followed it with another first-down carry. With CAL at the PRP 17, Sheehan rolled to his right on first down and lofted a pass toward Howard in the end zone. Howard elevated over the defense and made a spectacular catch for the touchdown.

McKinney then connected with Chapman Amlung, lined up at wide receiver, for the two-point conversion and a 20-6 CAL lead with only 48 seconds remaining in the half.

The Centurions weren't finished. Another excellent kick from McReynolds pinned PRP at its own 20. Cooper Happel and Colt Bindner combined for a second-down tackle, and Graham Miller showed great pursuit to track down the ball carrier on fourth down, turning the ball over to CAL at the PRP 25 with only nine seconds remaining.

Nine seconds proved to be plenty. McKinney immediately fired a strike to Sheehan, who took it down to the 11-yard line. On the next play, Sheehan swept around the right side and crossed the goal line as time expired.

On the conversion, McKinney worked through his progressions, found nobody open, tucked the ball and rumbled around the right side himself to send CAL into halftime with a commanding 27-6 advantage.

The Centurions received the second-half kickoff and immediately picked up where they left off.

Clark took a jet sweep around the left side for 20 yards, putting multiple PRP defenders on skates with a series of cuts and jukes before finally being brought down. Sheehan followed by

hammering straight up the middle for another first down to reach the PRP 30.

Then CAL went back to the air.

Sheehan rolled out and delivered another beautiful ball to Howard, who hauled it in for his second touchdown reception of the afternoon. McKinney completed the conversion pass to Sheehan, stretching the lead to 35-6.

PRP threatened to answer with a big kickoff return, but Miles Happel made a touchdown-saving tackle. Demario Hatchett recorded a stop on the ensuing possession, and Weston Woodall followed with a strong run stuff on the next play.

Then Kieran O'Reilly slammed the door, intercepting a PRP pass and giving the football back to the Centurions. With approximately three minutes remaining and the clock running, CAL turned to Lawyer.

On first down, Lawyer took a direct snap for 15 yards. On the very next play, he burst through the middle, broke into the open field and raced 60 yards to the house for the final score of the afternoon.

Final: Christian Academy 41, PRP 6.

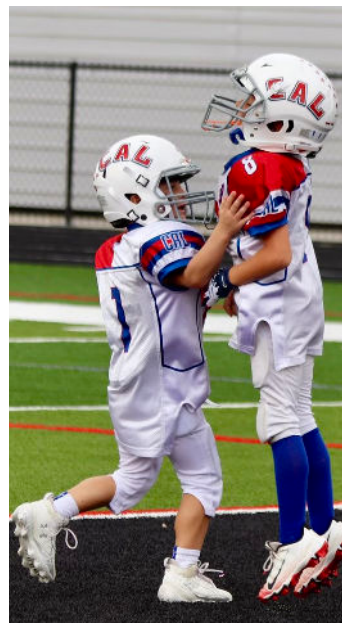
1st/2nd football competes well at PRP
