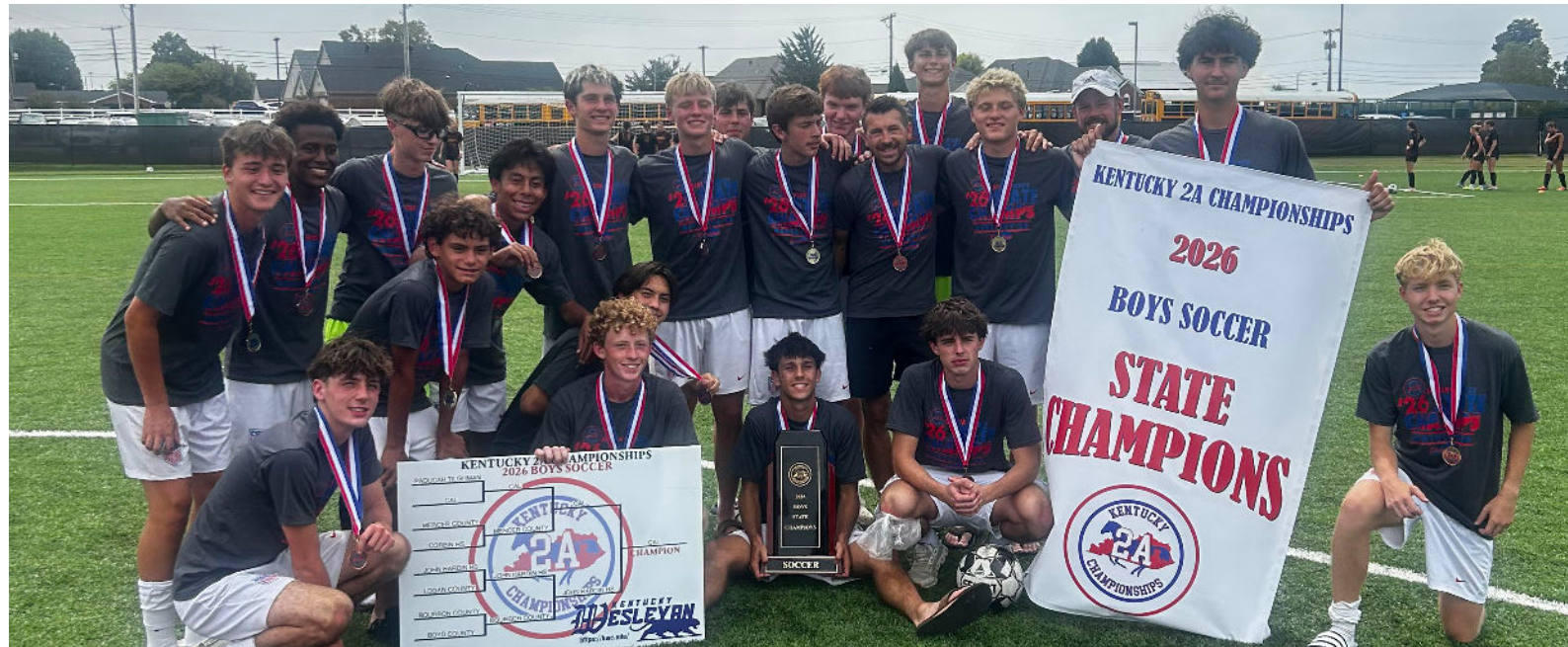




STATE CHAMPIONS

Varsity boys soccer earns program's first 2A state title



The varsity boys soccer team continued a historic start to the 2026 season by capturing the 2A state championship in Owensboro last weekend.

On Saturday, CAL rolled past Mercer County 8-0 in the semifinal. Noble Marcum and Braden Hack found the back of the net twice for the Centurions, with Hayden Durst, Luke Derhake, Noah Gividen and Levi Victor all adding a goal apiece.

It was more of the same for the Centurions in a 5-0 victory over John Hardin in the championship game on Sunday.

Gividen gave CAL a 1-0 lead in the first half, and then CAL exploded for four goals in the second half. Luke Derhake (two), Dylan Peace and Hayden Durst all chipped in after the break to put the game well out of reach.

The Centurions are now 15-0 following a 3-0 win over Collegiate on Monday – the best start in program history. Ranked No. 2 in Kentucky and first in District 28, the Centurions have outscored opponents 59-5.

Senior Noah Torrens has led the attack with 14 goals and 6 assists (34 points) and averaged 1.4 goals per game entering the weekend. He has been the difference in several tight wins, including a recent 2-0 district victory over Kentucky Country Day. Derhake and Durst have 10 and nine goals, respectively. Sophomore Isaiah Clark paces the team in playmaking with 5 assists. Marcum and Victor have added timely assists.

In goal, senior Mav Uhrig has 7 shutouts. The defense in front of him has allowed just five goals all season.

CAL will be back in action Thurs-

day when it travels to Ballard for a 28th District clash at 7:45 p.m.

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Varsity volleyball reaches 2A state semifinals

The HS volleyball program put together a highly competitive week on the court, highlighted by strong performances across all squads and an appearance in the 2A State Championship.

Monday, September 14: Domination Against Franklin County

The Centurions opened their week with a sweeping success across all three levels against Franklin County.

- Varsity: Secured a gritty victory, winning 3 out of 4 sets to set a winning tone for the week.
- JV: Kept the momentum alive, battling to a victory by taking 2 out of 3 sets.
- Freshmen: Showed great resilience on the court, winning a full 3-set match.

Tuesday, September 15: Battle With Bethlehem High School

CAL faced a tough road test against Bethlehem High School, resulting in hard-fought matches across the board.

- Varsity: Continued their winning streak with another strong performance, taking 3 out of 4 sets for the victory.
- JV: Played an incredibly even matchup, ultimately ending in a tie after splitting the sets.
- Freshmen: Fought hard but couldn't find their rhythm, falling to Bethlehem in 2 straight sets.

2A State Championship Tournament & Individual Highlights

The Varsity squad advanced to the prestigious Kentucky 2A State Championship tournament, where they faced off against a formidable opponent in the semifinals.

- Varsity vs. Whitley County: CAL laid it all on the line against a very tough Whitley County team. Despite a fierce effort and winning 1 out of 4 sets, the Centurions ultimately finished as the state runner-up.
- All-Tournament Team Honors: Following their stellar individual performances throughout the tournament run, standouts Kayleigh Rogers and Kally Roy were both named to the Kentucky 2A All-Tournament Team.

The Centurions gained valuable experience and are continuing to improve. Seven runners scored personal bests: Caleb Fletcher, Silas Nelson, Reagan Myers, Josh Neher, Zac Martin, Hannah Whitford and Amelia Bock.

Varsity boys golf takes 2nd at region tourney

state.

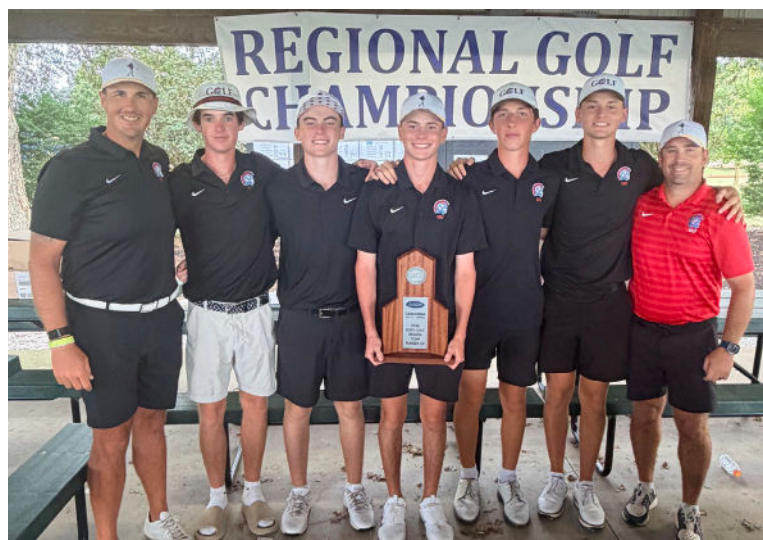

Varsity football blanks Central Hardin

Last Thursday night, the Centurions proved they can be a force to reckon with under the lights. CAL traveled down I-65 to take on the 6A Central Hardin Bruins, who are having a rebuilding season. It might have been easy for the Centurions to let their guard down, but the team remains locked in on the prize waiting at the end of the season which means no letting up.

With a commanding 65-0 victory over Central Hardin, CAL made sure they were not going to be the first team of the season to let Bruins put points on the scoreboard.

CALBELLS

The Bruins got the party started with a short, onside kick to the waiting Centurions. Unfortunately

for them, the waiting Centurion was junior Johnny Tully! Tully scooped up the ball and took off racing to the end zone for the first of many CAL touchdowns on the night with just seven seconds ticking by. The play happened so fast that most of the Centurion Faithful hadn't unpacked their CALbells yet, resulting in a disappointing lack of ringing for CAL's first six. We'll be sure to have CALbells ready before kickoff Friday night!

TOP GUN

CAL fans know we have a top notch quarterback in junior Captain Jackson Burke; and now the entire state knows it! The most recent KH-SAA stats show Burke ranked #1 in the state in passing completion percentage (.872) and #1 in passing

touchdowns (29). Thursday night, Burke gave the crowd at Central Hardin a firsthand look at exactly how he earned those top spots. Burke was perfect through the air, completing 8 of 8 passes for 200 yards and four touchdowns.

TOP TARGET

Burke isn't the only Centurion sitting at the top of the state rankings. Senior Captain Ja'Hyde Brown is currently #1 in receiving touchdowns (15) and #1 in receiving touchdowns per game (3.0). Four of those 15 touchdowns came Thursday night as Brown hauled in all six passes thrown his way, totalling 177 yards. Brown showed just how dangerous he can be once the ball is in his hands with his

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longest reception of the night going for 65 yards.

GROUND GAME

CAL's air game was on center stage Thursday night, but that didn't mean the ground game didn't earn a few CALbells as well.

Junior Gabriel Lumpkin only needed one carry to add six points to the Centurions' total. Lumpkin took the handoff and wasted no time, bursting through the Bruins' defense for a quick 16 yard trip to the end zone.

Senior Garyon Hobbs led the rushing attack with 29 yards on three carries while senior Trevor McDill added 20 yards on just two carries. Burke even got in on the rushing game as he added 11 yards to the team's total by outrunning the Bruins' defense.

DEFEATING DEFENSE

The Centurion defense has proven week after week to be both physically and mentally defeating to any opponent that gets in their way. Currently CAL is ranked #3 in the state in points allowed per game (4.2).

SAFETY SPARKS SIX

Senior Captain Micah Newsome made one of the biggest defensive plays of the night when he took down a Bruin in the end zone for a safety, putting two more points on the board for CAL. But the Centurions weren't finished. On the ensuing kickoff, junior Jayden Leak fielded the ball and took it all the way to the house for a touchdown. In a matter of seconds, the Centurions went from a huge defen-

sive play to celebrating in the end zone once again.

EVERYONE'S IN ON THE ACTION

CAL's defense continues to prove that stopping opponents is a total team effort. Thursday night 18 different Centurions recorded either a solo or assisted tackle. Newsome and junior Kellan Hall continued to show how dangerous they are to offensives with seven total tackles apiece. Senior Ty Binder was right behind them with six total tackles, while junior Noah Perkins added five.

HARE RAISING

Sophomore Eli Hare put on a show Thursday night against the Bruins! Hare led the Centurion defense with eight total tackles on the night as well as the most solo tackles with three. Play after play Hare fought off defenders to find the ball carrier, wrapping them up, and taking them down hard!

TAKE IT TO THE HOUSE

Senior Captain Ja'hyde Brown and senior Garyon Hobbs had fun with punt returns Thursday night. For the majority of the evening, the Centurions allowed the ball to roll rather than attempting a return. However, on two occasions, Brown and Hobbs showed the Bruins why they should never take their eyes off this dynamic duo.

Brown fooled everyone, as he made it look like he was going to let the punt roll. Instead, he scooped up the ball and took off downfield, racing 59 yards to the end zone for another Centurion touchdown.

Hobbs added some excitement of his own on his punt return. Bobbing and weaving his way through several Bruins before breaking free into the open field. There was no catching him as he turned the return into a 65 yard trip to the end zone and six more points for CAL.

ONE MAN SHOW

Senior kicker Madden Miller had a busy night as the lone kicker for the evening. Miller added nine points to the scoreboard for CAL, going a perfect 9 for 9 on PATs. On kickoffs, Miller sent six of his nine kicks into the end zone for touchbacks, forcing the Bruins to start deep in their own territory. Miller also took care of CAL's lone punt of the night, pinning the Bruins inside their own one yard line prior to the aforementioned safety.

TRUE TEST

After cruising to a 65-0 victory over Central Hardin, the Centurions are all business this week as they prepare for what might be the toughest competition of the regular season. CAL travels to Bowling Green to take on the 5A Purples Friday night. There will be little room for error in this matchup. The Centurions will need to be locked in from the opening whistle and play at a high level on both sides of the ball if they want to make the trip home with another W. Kickoff is 6:30 PM CDT with the Senior Class calling for western wear, so dust off those boots and saddle up to head west to cheer on our Centurions!

5th/6th football jets past Spencer County

The Christian Academy of Louisville Juniors combined explosive plays on offense with another dominant defensive effort Saturday at Bachman Field, shutting out the Spencer County Stallions 30-0.

CAL needed exactly one play to announce what kind of afternoon it was going to be.

On the Centurions' first snap from

scrimmage, Preston Burge took the handoff and exploded for 40 yards, racing all the way down to the Spencer County 5-yard line.

Two plays later, quarterback Miles Johnston rolled to his right and found Gavin Ihnen for the touchdown. The extra-point pass was unsuccessful, but CAL had grabbed an immediate 6-0 lead.

Then the defense took its turn. Spencer County's opening possession reached fourth down, where Jonathan Jackson came screaming into the backfield and delivered heavy pressure and a hit on the quarterback as he released the ball. The hurried throw sailed into the hands of Johnny Newsome for the interception, giving CAL

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possession at the Stallions' 30-yard line.

The Centurions quickly went hunting for another score.

Alex Edison took a swing pass around the right side, made multiple defenders miss and appeared to take it all the way to the end zone, only to have the play wiped out.

No problem.

Two plays later, Johnston dropped back and fired a dart to Edison, who ran a beautiful route, made the catch and turned upfield for the touchdown. CAL led 12-0 with 36 seconds remaining in the first quarter.

The Centurion defense continued to control the game in the second quarter, eventually forcing another turnover on downs and handing the

offense the football at its own 40 with six minutes remaining in the half.

This time Beckham Albright stepped in at quarterback.

Albright dropped back and connected with Carter Lee, who broke loose for a touchdown to extend the Centurion advantage.

Spencer County was stopped again, giving CAL one more opportunity just before halftime — and Albright and Lee weren't finished.

With only 15 seconds remaining, Albright found Bryson Hamilton over the middle. Hamilton secured the pass, turned upfield and did the rest, racing 50 yards for another Centurion touchdown.

The explosive play sent CAL into the break firmly in control.

The Centurion defense made sure there would be no second-half comeback.

Avery Denton came up with another big defensive play, forcing a Spencer County fumble, and Aiden Brooks pounced on the loose football to give possession right back to CAL.

The offense didn't need long to capitalize.

Burge took the handoff, found daylight and ripped off a 50-yard touchdown run, his second huge run of the afternoon, to push the advantage to 30-0 entering the fourth quarter.

From there, CAL finished the job and preserved the shutout.

3rd/4th football shuts out Spencer County

The Christian Academy of Louisville Pee Wee Centurions used a dominant defensive performance and a four-touchdown first half from Christian Sheehan to roll past the Spencer County Stallions, 32-0, Saturday at CAL's Bachman Field.

CAL received the opening kickoff but saw its first possession stall on fourth down, giving Spencer County an early opportunity to take control. Instead, the Centurion defense set the tone for the afternoon.

Matthew McKinney, Sheehan and Madden Johnston all made tackles on Spencer County's opening possession, eventually forcing the Stallions into fourth-and-nine. Spencer County converted with a swing pass that broke into the open field before Sheehan made a touchdown-saving tackle. The Stallions continued their long drive into CAL territory, but the first quarter ended scoreless with Spencer County facing fourth-and-11 in the red zone.

That's when Miles Happel came up with the first huge defensive play of the day, bursting into the backfield for a fourth-down sack and turning the

ball over to the Centurions.

CAL's offense took advantage. Several strong direct-snap runs from Sheehan, along with an end-around, moved the chains. Then McKinney went under center, calmly handled an errant snap and found Sheehan downfield. Sheehan shed two defenders, broke into the open field and raced 40 yards for the touchdown.

McKinney fired a bullet to Chapman Amlung for the two-point conversion, giving CAL an 8-0 lead with 5:12 remaining in the half.

The Centurion defense went right back to work.

Miles and Cooper Happel recorded tackles, while Kieran O'Reilly broke up a pass and combined with Charles Richtarsic for another stop. On fourth-and-eight, Spencer County returned to the swing pass that had hurt CAL earlier.

This time Johnston was waiting for it.

Johnston diagnosed the play immediately and blew it up as soon as the receiver made the catch, turning the Stallions over on downs and giving CAL the football at the Spencer Coun-

ty 30 with three minutes remaining.

On the very first play, Sheehan kept it and ripped off 25 yards to reach the 5. CAL went right back to him on the next snap, and Sheehan finished the drive for his second touchdown of the afternoon.

The conversion was unsuccessful, but CAL had stretched its lead to 14-0. Then the game began to get away from Spencer County.

Miles Happel and Weston Woodall each recorded sacks on the Stallions' next possession, forcing fourth-and-19 and a punt. Ryan Clark fielded it and took it all the way back for what appeared to be a touchdown, only to have the return erased by a holding penalty.

It hardly mattered.

Sheehan took another direct snap and found the end zone again, completing his first-half hat trick and pushing the CAL advantage to 20-0 with only 32 seconds remaining. And somehow, the Centurions still weren't finished.

On Spencer County's very next of-

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-fensive play, Amlung came screaming into the backfield and forced a strip sack. The football popped into the air, where Miles Happel secured it to give CAL yet another possession.

McKinney immediately dropped back and hit Sheehan on a slant. Sheehan did the rest, taking it to the house for his fourth touchdown of the first half.

Spencer County got the football one final time before the break, but there was still no relief from the CAL pass

rush. O'Reilly pressured the quarterback before Woodall punctuated the half with another sack.

The second half began exactly the way the first had ended — with the CAL defense in control.

Silas McReynolds delivered an excellent kickoff that pinned the Stallions at their own 15. Jack Dudgeon, AJ Sierra and Paxton Satterwhite all contributed tackles as the Centurions

continued to swarm the football. Then William Ritchie delivered the final blow.

Ritchie jumped a Spencer County pass, picked it off and took it all the way back for a touchdown, putting an exclamation point on a tremendous defensive performance and extending the CAL lead to 32-0.

From there, the Centurions closed out the shutout.
